

Scope and Aims

The ECPR Press publishes original research from leading political scientists and the best amongst young scholars in the discipline. Its scope extends to all fields of political science, international relations and political thought, without restriction in either approach or regional focus. It is also open to interdisciplinary work with a predominant political dimension. Publications by the Press are refereed by either the members of the Editorial Board or by external readers. The Press has four main series: *ECPR – Studies in European Political Research*, *Monographs*, *Classics*, and *Essays*.

The **ECPR - Studies in European Political Science Series** comprises edited volumes that either open up new lines of research in the discipline, or synthesise work done through collective research projects at either national or international level. Collective work and research networks are important sources for new ideas in political science. Whereas traditional publishers have become more hesitant in publishing edited volumes, the ECPR Press wishes to provide a friendly environment for such publications, allowing editors and contributors to plan in advance and to set-up their research agenda in imaginative and innovative ways. Most of the volumes originate from ECPR events including: the Joint Sessions of Workshops, the Research Sessions, and the General Conferences.

The **Monographs Series** publishes work by both young and established political scientists. Publication of work by young scholars is welcome, based either on the revised version of their doctoral dissertation or on their subsequent work. Winners of the Jean Blondel Prize have the opportunity to be published within this series. The series also welcomes monographs by well established scholars, particularly if these have already been published in another language but are not available in English.

The **Classics Series** makes available to students and political scientists, work that has had an impact in the discipline, but is no longer in print. Each book is carefully re-published and includes a new introduction by the author or the editor of the reprint aimed to contextualise the original publication and update some of the findings or the ideas that made the book successful in the first place.

The **Essays Series** comprises both essay-like volumes that put forward an argument or a thesis about specific issues in political science, and single-and co-authored collections of essays. Essay-like books have an important role in the discipline because they make accessible research in a particular field to scholars working in other fields, and to the public at large. Collections of essays provide a vehicle for established scholars to put together essays and articles on the same or on related themes (and occasionally on disparate issues) that have already appeared in journals and edited volumes. Such books have many practical and intellectual advantages. A great deal of research in political science and political thought is produced in journal articles and essay form. Making these works available in a single volume provides a service to students of politics, while offering the author an opportunity to reflect on their own intellectual journey across different themes and occasionally different fields of enquiry. Through new and original introductions, the authors can also provide a context, a narrative, and further reflection on their original work.

One Common Aim

One common aim throughout the ECPR Press' series is to contribute to the creation of a European-wide discourse in political science. The multiplicity of national traditions and languages in Europe poses a difficulty to the circulation of ideas and to the communication between political scientists across Europe. The

establishment of English as the de-facto lingua franca of the international academic community has partly alleviated such a difficulty; while, at the same time, risking sidelining important traditions of research, and significant groups of scholars who do not work in English. The ECPR Press intends to bring to the attention of the larger European and international political science community work that deserves wider circulation, but whose reach is limited by language barriers. The Press welcomes suggestions from ECPR members, and other scholars and organisations about texts that are worthy of translation, and in particular suggestions of funding opportunities in order to finance such work. In principle, the ECPR Press is also open to publishing in languages other than English, where this is both economically feasible and academically advisable. The publication in other languages is intended as a contribution to the maintenance of a proper balance between easing communication and respecting difference, both of which we regard as important principles for an academic community.
